Class 3


We have had a productive beginning to the year. In Science we have completed our *Forces and Friction* topic by doing an investigation into how different surfaces impact on how a car travels down a ramp.





In Art we have been doing detailed observational drawings of rainforest creatures and used colouring pencils to colour them. We have also been using viewfinders to zoom in on different parts of rainforest plants or creatures and making abstract pictures.

October has been Black History Month. We have had assemblies celebrating different black people in history and we have also been discussing this further in the classroom. Class Three were set a challenge to independently investigate an inspirational person and we were delighted with the amount of interest and work that the children put in. We have found out about popstars such as Myles Smith and Whitney Houston. We have also found out about talented sports stars such as Marcus Rashford and Katrina Johnson-Thompson. Khalifa and Ariana did a special fact file all about their great grandfather Charlie Collins who was a reggae pioneer.



We are looking forward to furthering our learning after the half term break.

Class 4

In class 4 we have now finished Hidden Figures, lots of interesting writing has been created and we can now look forward to watching the film.

We are finishing our science topic of the Solar System and starting a book about the Curiosity Rover on Mars.



Mathematics has been working well, getting to grips with long multiplication and short division.
